

Dance for Children and Youth April 2018



How precious are the young ones in God's sight. They have so much to learn, explore and discover. Have you ever woken up so discouraged and said to the Lord, "All I want is a hug from You today".....

I went to church and had a hard time getting into worship—as I felt heavy in my heart. I sat down during the offering and then it was as if I felt two hands on either side of my face turning my head to the right back hand side of the church. I saw a little four year old boy sitting on his mother's lap and watched as he jumped off her lap, ran along the wall, stood in front of me, looked deep into my eyes — it was like those eyes looked through me—like Jesus Himself looking at me and said, "I came to give you a hug!" I opened up my arms and as this little boy hugged me I felt something impart into me. He then released me, jumped back and said, "I have to go back to my Mommy now!" and I watched him run back and jump back on his mother's lap.

God wants to use children to speak for Him, sometimes just to hug for Him. The embrace of a child, sometimes exactly at the right time, can heal a broken heart. Children are so dear and precious and I pray we can receive from children, just as they receive from us.

Do you need a hug from Jesus today? Where ever you might be—open up your arms and receive a hug from Jesus. I pray Jesus would give a special touch to you. The Lord is faithful, He will strengthen and protect you. Psalm 31 ... "The Lord preserves the faithful. Be strong and take heart all you who hope in the Lord."

Children in Church ... Dance

There are many ways for Children to Dance in Church. Some churches have Children's Dance Groups that meet mid week or before Church. Some work on choreographies for presentation. Some have Dance Schools where children learn to dance and prepare technically for examinations. Some use dance to reach out to children in the community - through dance and fun showing the love and joy of Jesus. The question I've been asked is, 'What did we do?'

My work in dance with children in church started seriously when I was asked to coordinate our Church's Children's Ministry. Dance was already an accepted part of worship in Church and, at this point, became a natural part of our teaching programme with children. The purpose for us was to give tools to the children for their time in church services, especially tools for worship and prayer. We also explored dance in storytelling.



It wasn't about performance, it was about worship.

All of the church children were taught about the place of dance in personal worship in church and also in leading of worship through dance. When in church, there was space for them to dance in their own worship. There was also space to dance when presenting. Personal worship, then, was the foundation for any presentation as we were preparing the children to be 'worshippers'.

How did we do it?

we taught creative dance, dancing with flags, ribbons, dowel rod and staffs with all children. The children who went to dance classes outside of church, brought their ballet, freestyle, etc
we created choreographed pieces with the children ... not always for presentation but as part of their teaching programme. We used dance, props, puppets and parachute in creative storytelling
we modelled dance as we were dancing in our own worship

In addition

- we provided opportunity for the creative arts ... in clay, painting, writing, cooking ... using these also from time to time in church as part of our response / prayer especially in all-age services

- we taught the children about missions
- we taught the children to pray

Alongside this, we were also teaching on the Gifts of the Spirit, likening these to 'a toolbox' ... the Gifts were given by the Holy Spirit and were available for children as well as adults - that God would use them now, as children, in ministry. The Fruit of the Spirit was also taught as we made application for living our lives for Jesus.

I am no longer involved in the Children's Ministry at this Church but dance lives on in the church and the children have opportunity to dance in their worship. Two of the children, now young people, danced with their parents at their baptism and confirmation service. We have much for praise!

The Children of Kwadacha

Belma Vardy is well-known in ICDF for the work she is doing among the First Nation people living on the Reservations in Canada. In this contribution she shares about her recent experiences with a group of children.

work a lot with the First Nations children on the Reservations. This past summer my co-worker, Becky Thomas, and I were teaching children on the Reservation.

One of the villages we flew into is called Kawadacha which consists of 350 people in a remote area in the middle of nowhere—2 hours south of the Yukon River. A huge trading area, lots of animals, traplines set around many lakes and rivers, this Reserve is situated on the Finley River. Originally all the people of Kwadacha were the outcasts of other tribes and independent of each other. If you couldn't live peaceably with your tribe you were taken off the territory and brought here to live because it was so a inaccessible. Everyone from this village had been expelled from their tribe and no one got along. Think of the wild west—it was that type of atmosphere. Back in the day when people were expelled from Australia and sent to Britain to be put into prison—Native people didn't have prisons so they all ended up in this territory — "no man's land" and settled here.

When the government became aware of the people living here, they started sending in planes to round up the children and take them to Residential School. Every Christmas they would return the children and leave them by the river. So one man built a cabin along the river so he could be there when his children came home. The rest of the families began to build in the same area so they became loosely connected just based on the fact they were all waiting for their children to come home. Sad thing is not all these children ever made it home. The children that did make it back are now all the elders and descendants. Even from the air one could see the depression and poverty that had gripped this village. Every house had 2 or more windows smashed in which is the result of people drinking and then throwing their bottles through the windows.

When we arrived on Kwadacha Nation, the Chief was there to greet us and welcome us on to his land. We could see the children and youth coming through the wilderness to greet us. Within an hour of landing we started teaching the children and youth. Becky taught ukulele and I taught Hawaiian and worship dance. Every morning Jeanie and Henry, a couple who had driven up with our props, would pick up all the children and bring them to the church where we were teaching. Jeanie and Henry had brought \$1000 worth of food as their love offering to both these villages and would feed the children and youth a healthy breakfast so they would be energized for their ukulele and dance classes. Part-way through the week we piled all 40 children into different vehicles and we took them to a place called Sucker Lake where they got baptized.

Every day the children and youth came to class more excited than the day before. At the end of the week they did a presentation of ukulele songs and dances. Most parents did not show as they were either fighting hang overs from the night before or had started their drinking early for the night. It was heartbreaking to see the longing in the children's eyes and then to see the disappointment written all over their faces when the parents never walked through the door.

Nevertheless they did a fabulous job —had so much fun—their favourite song being a rocky version of "Jesus Loves Me". The children screeched, laughed and jumped up and down a lot doing that song.

After the presentation there was another feast of food provided by Jeanie and Henry. As our time came to an end, we gifted the children with a ukulele and songbook, Hawaiian grass skirts with leis and flowers, beautiful shawls for the girls, flags for the boys, and T shirts for all. We left behind Becky's music and many of my books. With many hugs, kisses and tears our good byes were said and we watched the children walk back to their homes, ukuleles on their back, wearing their shawls, grass skirts and leis and carrying their flags.

What Becky and I were most excited about on this trip was being able to put tools into the hands of the people —the combination of my story and Becky's music —to be able to leave behind tools to help them worship and to heal.

I share this story as dance does not always have the same look, is not always done in a classroom or out for evangelism - but sometimes takes us into the most remote places to bring a little bit of joy and restoration. We pray that our Creator—Father God—continue to pour out His blessings upon "children in dance".

Testimony: Aligning the past, present and the future

For countless youth the dance company has been a place of refuge and growth. Here we have the tesimony of Jacqlynne Tumusiime from Uganda, who now is one of our youngest Country Representatives in ICDF. She speaks about her growth as a dancer in her youth, a Christian and more recently as a leader.

One cannot harvest what hasn't been tilled. We don't have many seasons in Uganda except for hot and rainy seasons. These seasons in the recent past all co-exist. We go from a heavy down pour in the morning to a very hot afternoon and vice versa. But the season of autumn for me resounds harvest. This is a season for dance in Uganda to harvest what has been tilled and cultivated in ministry through the year.

I come from a nation that thinks everyone can dance. The thought of dance in a learning setting get many laughing and wondering how that is possible. We can't blame them. No! I honour the anointing of those that have gone before us in dance. Those that bore the scorn and held the banners high. I honour the men and women of God that gave us opportunities to experience dance beyond the traditions and forms of expressions we knew. The churches, projects and festivals that opened their doors for our learning and allowed us as youth to take to the pulpit and minister. Those that believed in us and even those that didn't. They all gave us a drive to keep going.

Something new is happening in dance here in Uganda. As a language, now more than ever dance in Uganda is uniting churches, families and giving many a sense of belonging. First dance in churches just drew youth to Christ. I am one of the youth that stumbled into a church building and never left. My purposes and divine calling started in dance.

I can witness to many destinies aligned through dance from the testimonies I have heard over the years. One such phenomena is with Clay Dance Company, a dance group that mentored me for the most part of my dance life. Many over the last 10 years have testified that when they joined in dance, they felt loved, belonged to a family, and discovered their potential through dance. They felt like they belonged to a family of Christian believers that accepted them. Such is the story of Clay Dance Co.

We all come from all walks of life and Clay Dance Co. became a home and nurtured us in all varied abilities, callings and purposes. I have said this before and will say it again, my background in dance made multimedia and live production a breeze of a success. The dancer on stage and the excellent behind the scenes person I later became showed forth much fruit to the glory of God.

It is this same fruit that got me yearning to see more in dance and out of media as I pursued an unknown path, pushing my limits into dance education and now creative arts education. I am amazed every day and I could go on and on.

But let's get back to the point here, dance in churches in Uganda is part of the huge revival. First with uniting churches and then getting into another level of ministration. We have come from a place of ministration where many are touched and are entering a place where lives are changed;

lives of those that came for healing, restoration and redemption are changed forever. This for me is a prophetic word we already have spoken. By the leading of Holy Spirit as we yield to the truths of the Word, it has to and should manifest its designed power for the completion and fulfilment of our purposes in worship unto Christ Jesus.

When we take to the pulpits this year, as our destinies are aligned the congregation will be aligned too, broken bones will be restored and hearts will be mended. As a minister in dance specifically in administration, I have the honour to build on the foundations we have in dance worship, dance education and later creative arts education in my country. ICDF gives me such joy to serve in this capacity. For this year our focus will be Unity of the Church. ICDF Uganda will host inter-church workshops where dancers will be sharing and learning from one another, in the Word, dance worship and prayer for the glory of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.







CDFB: A Fellowship for All Ages

The Christian Dance Fellowship of Britain was the first ICDF country to recognise that the youth needed a special focus and place within the fellowship. This was achieved many years ago by appointing a National Youth Coordinator. The present coordinator is Steven Turner. Steven writes ...



For a few years now I have been the National Youth Coordinator of CDF Britain. Over this time it has been my privilege to represent young people's opinions on National Committee and teach Youth workshops all over England. Through the Youth Leaders' training course I completed a few years back, I gained tools that enabled me to take on board the opinions of young people and then represent them to the wider community.

One of the biggest strengths in CDFB is the diversity of people that it contains, on the other hand this also creates its challenges. Over time culture changes - from the dance performance styles used, to the means of communication that the youth of today use. However, having said that, the best "youth workshops" I have taught have been when we have all ages there.

With the pace of modern day life, I have found that it is best to use lots of different styles and techniques in a dance day for young people and keep moving. The key is to develop a safe working environment where everyone is having fun and, when this is done, then you can get people interacting across the age spectrum and learning from each other.


